Interstate Four (I-4) Changes to Expansion Plan to be Presented at May 2nd CPNA Meeting

Over the past couple of years the College Park Neighborhood Association has been a source of information concerning the proposed expansion and realignment of Interstate Four. In the entire 2.2 billion dollar project College Park is the most highly impacted neighborhood.

There have been significant changes made to the Interstate Four project due to adding lanes and drainage studies that require the purchase and destruction of additional properties in College Park. At the May 2, meeting of the College Park Neighborhood Association the Florida Department of Transportation will make a presentation that will outline the changes and their impact on College Park.

April CPNA Board of Directors Meeting Recap

- Dr. Osteen, Principal of Princeton Elementary, was presented with the Michael Welborn Grant
- March meeting minutes were approved with slight changes as was the Treasure's report
- Reports were given by the Treasurer, Sunday in the Park and an update on the future Executive Committee Meeting
- Recaps were given on March events, Sunday in the Park and the Easter Egg Hunt
- Discussion arose over how best to encourage residents to volunteer for future CPNA events and how to increase CPNA membership
- Mark Fisher presented an idea for a Scarecrow Festival in College Park. This would be a month long event that would include residents, businesses and raise money for local schools. Downtown College Park Partnership is organizing the event.
- City Commissioner Vicki Vargo spoke briefly about some current community projects and took questions from the audience.
- A letter was read from Phillis Dotherow, past CPNA board member
- Bill Jennings spoke about significant changes to the Interstate Four expansion plan. Florida Department of Transportation will be presenting changes at next CPNA meeting, May 2nd.
- A motion failed to put a temporary moratorium on "Letters to the Editor" in the newsletter until the Executive Committee determines newsletter guidelines
- Grace Hagedorn spoke further about the Welborn Grant and thanked the Dann Family for providing an additional \$100 donation for Princeton Elementary

Historic Homes Tour Yields \$1,100 for Princeton Elementary School

Princeton Elementary received three checks at the April CPNA meeting deriving from CPNA's 14th Historic Homes Tour, held in the Dubsdread area on Nov. 21, 2004.

The annual \$500 Michael Welborn CPNA Education Grant, given the year after the tour that funds

it, is awarded to local schools in memory of CPNA's late Vice-President and Historical Committee Co-chair, H. Michael Welborn. Michael was particularly interested in educating the public about local history and architecture through CPNA's Annual Historic Homes Tours & through his membership on the Central Florida Historical Society Board & the Orlando Historic Preservation Board.

A second \$500 grant was an extra voted by the CPNA Board to recognize the outstanding cooperation afforded the 2004 tour by a number of Princeton Elementary parents and tour hosts, who knew that the tour would benefit Princeton this year. Thanks to them, the tour raised substantially more money than expected.

At the April CPNA meeting, two checks were presented to Princeton Elementary's Principal Dr. Margaret Osteen by CPNA President Lillian Scott. In attendance with Dr. Osteen were tour hosts Cindy Christmas and Gina Radcliff and their children. Later in the meeting tour host Shelia Dann brought a \$100 check for Princeton from her husband, Dr. Carl (Sandy) Dann III. In the 1920's his grandfather, H. Carl Dann, established Dubsdread Golf Course and Country Club and several surrounding subdivisions. The Danns live in the house that was built for his grandfather.

The designation of Princeton Elementary as a City of Orlando Historic Landmark was one of the initial goals of CPNA through its Historical Committee. CPNA prepared and submitted the landmark nomination, and after it was approved in the summer of 1989, ordered and paid for the plaque next to the front entrance. CPNA's annual meeting that fall celebrated the landmark status. Princeton was built in 1926.

In 2001, Princeton Elementary students, under the leadership of Dr. Mary Travis, helped CPNA match a Mayor's Neighborhood Matching Grant outlining historic resources in College Park. Next month, National Historic Preservation Month, CPNA Historical Committee Co-Chair Mary will again visit Princeton to interact with the students.

A Message from the City on How to Help Prevent Water Pollution in Our City Lakes

Excessive leaves and debris going down storm drains can be the source of serious problems. They can cause clogged storm drains resulting in an increased in flooding potential. Decomposing leaves and grass clippings contain high concentrations of the nutrients nitrogen and phosphorus, which are the most common cause of lake pollution in urban lakes. Although some storm drain outfalls have debris collection devices installed that filter out some of this pollution, most curbside storm drains carry runoff directly to a lake. Because all City residents live within a lake's drainage basin, all residents can have an impact on nearby recreational lakes by way of underground pipes.

Please help spread the word: Leaves and grass clippings should NOT be mowed, blown, or swept into the street - they should be bagged for Solid Waste's yard trash collection on Wednesdays, or recycled in your yard as mulch for trees and shrubs. The City's street sweeping services are designed to take care of natural leaf fall onto public streets, not those blown into the streets from the yards. Please remind your neighbors that it is each homeowner's and lawn maintenance personnel's responsibility to prevent leaves, grass clippings, and other small debris from yards, driveways, and sidewalks from entering the streets and storm water systems.

Remember, "Only Rain Down The Drain." Don't let pollution happen. Please call the **Stormwater Hotline** at **(407) 246-2370** if you wish to report any suspected illicit discharge or dumping into a City lake, street, or storm drain.

Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Hosts a Neighborhood Meeting

Charlene Mitchell from Isle of Catalina will talk about how organizations in her neighborhood worked together to respond to the recent hurricanes.

Edgewater High School's Crew Team Gets a New Boathouse

Sunday March 13, 2005 was the ribbon cutting ceremony of the new Edgewater High School (EHS) boathouse. The crew team is still rowing on Lake Fairview, but have moved to the North side of the lake. The new boathouse was made possible by a Field of Dreams grant from the City of Orlando along with many generous donations from crew families and friends of Edgewater High.

The City of Orlando worked with both EHS and Bishop Moore High School (BMHS) to promote the sport of crew. On June 23, 2003, the City of Orlando entered into a lease with the EHS crew team a/k/a Orlando Rowing Association for \$1 a year. The initial term of lease is for five years with three additional five year renewals (20 years). When the BMHS team construct their boathouse next door, both teams will work together to demolish the old bath house and rebuild a new facility.

In exchange for reduced rent, the teams must operate a summer rowing program. They must provide instruction for 40 LEADS camp participants at no cost to the participant or to our City. They are responsible for the maintenance of their boat house and the area surrounding it.
